Students arrange a time to meet with the Activities Director to discuss approval for the new club and, if approved, to arrange the paperwork for AAA approval and completion of the club constitution.

CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The following activities are a part of the curriculum and meet at regularly scheduled class times. Some require the approval of the instructor, and/or an audition as part of the registration process. Con Brio — This intermediate mixed choir is open to all students by audition.

Journalism

Broadcast Journalism (CT-TV)/Digital Media

Skills will be taught in advanced design, layout, filming, lighting, editing, and post-production techniques. As they plan and produce the school newsmagazine, **The Guide**, as well as contribute to cthstoday.org, students will study journalistic style and the basic requirements of investigative reporting. In addition, students will examine the production of newspapers and magazines, the history of journalism, and journalistic ethics. Students will be responsible for every aspect of creating a student publication: reporting, news and editorial writing, interviewing, editing, photography, layout and design, advertising design, advertising sales, and positive public relations.

Students must also continue their mathematical education by taking at least one math course beyond Algebra 2 each year. Application/selection process takes place in the fall.
